LOZ THE STATS MAN

As we enter the second half of the World Cup, Australia is well placed to make the top four, after winning it's last three matches. With the canny New Zealand to play on Saturday and out-of-form England seven days later (why such a long gap between matches is beyond me), plus Afghanistan (Nov 7) and Bangladesh (Nov 11) to go, the Aussies should make it with three wins in their last four games.

The good news is SA's own Travis Head is expected to play tomorrow night against the Kiwis, either replacing Cameron Green or Marnus Labuschagne in the lineup. I'd leave Green out, as his bowling has been ineffective of

late and Head will be a handy addition as a third spin option. Despite our better form, one cannot underestimate the Kiwis who have played above their weight at World Cups. Remember back to 1992, when spinner Dipak Patel used to open the bowling and Mark Greatbatch would smash the new ball bowlers over the infield in the early overs.

They made the Final at the MCG in 2015 before being blown away by Australia and then in then 2019 when they should have won the Final at Lord's, if it hadn't been for a catch being put down late on the boundary and some unlucky overthrows. They seem to peak for Cups and a small nation they play above their weight. They have also produced two of the all-time greats of in the last 50 years in paceman Sir Richard Hadlee and stylish batsman Martin Crowe.

In the last three games, David Warner (twice), Mitch Marsh and Glenn Maxwell have all produced centuries for Australia, while leggie Adam Zampa has come good with 12 wickets in the last three games. The new ball bowling was better versus the Dutch, but in the previous three games, their opponents have reached 100 before the first wicket has fallen, a worry for our aging pace attack. It should be a great game on Saturday afternoon (note the 3.30pm start not 7.30) – the Kiwis have some dangerous batsmen in Devon Conway and Daryl Mitchell, Lockie Ferguson has plenty of pace, while seamer Matt Henry and slow left-arm Mitch Santner are experienced performers.

In the Shield, the Redbacks started their game with current champions Western Australia, bowling them out on Thursday for 241, paceman Wes Agar taking career best figures of 6-42. WA had reached 1-102 and then 3-170 but the bowlers stuck to the task, with seven wickets falling after tea in a fine comeback by the home team. Closing the day on 0-27, SA has started well, if they are still batting on Saturday they have a big show of knocking over the Sandgropers.
